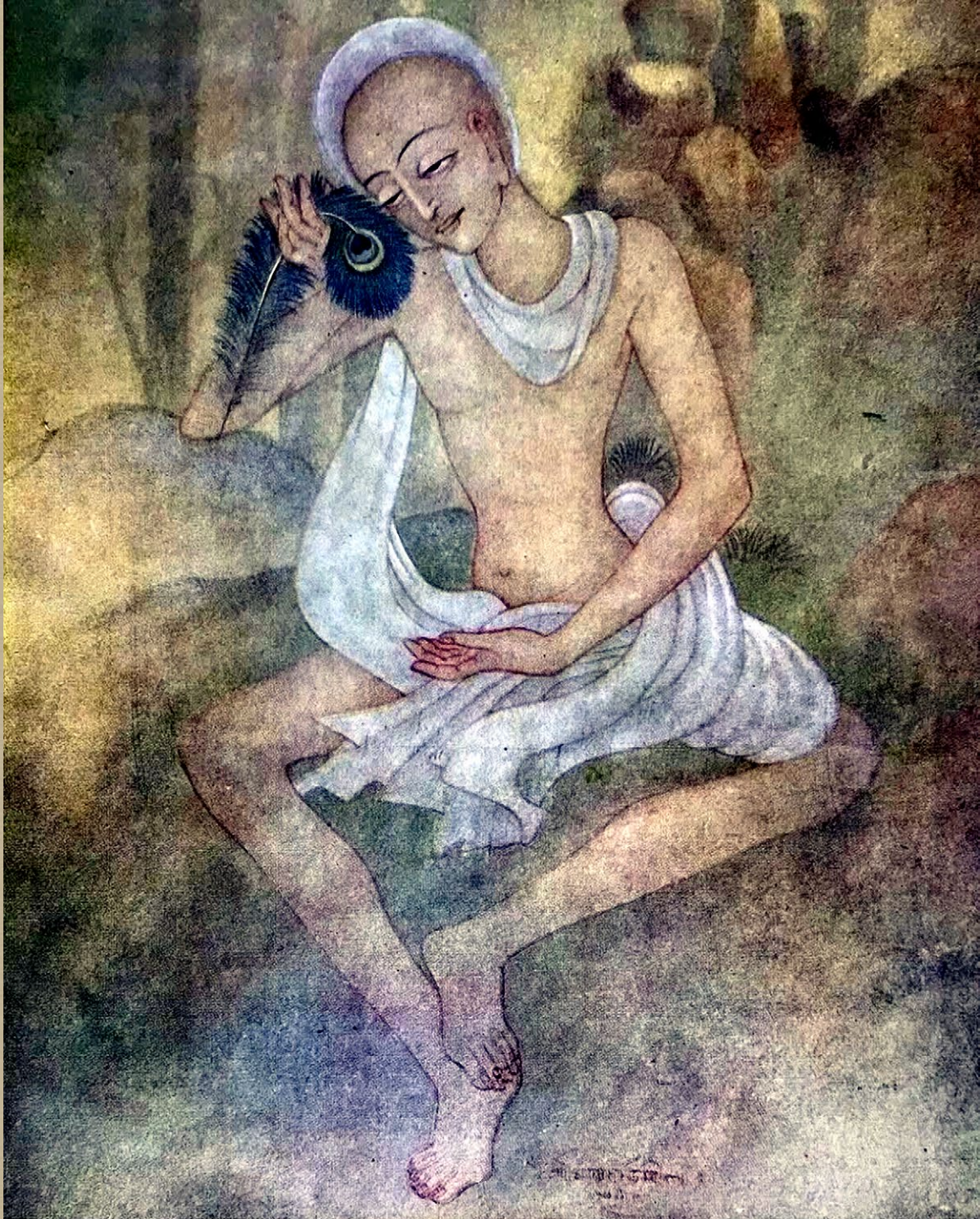

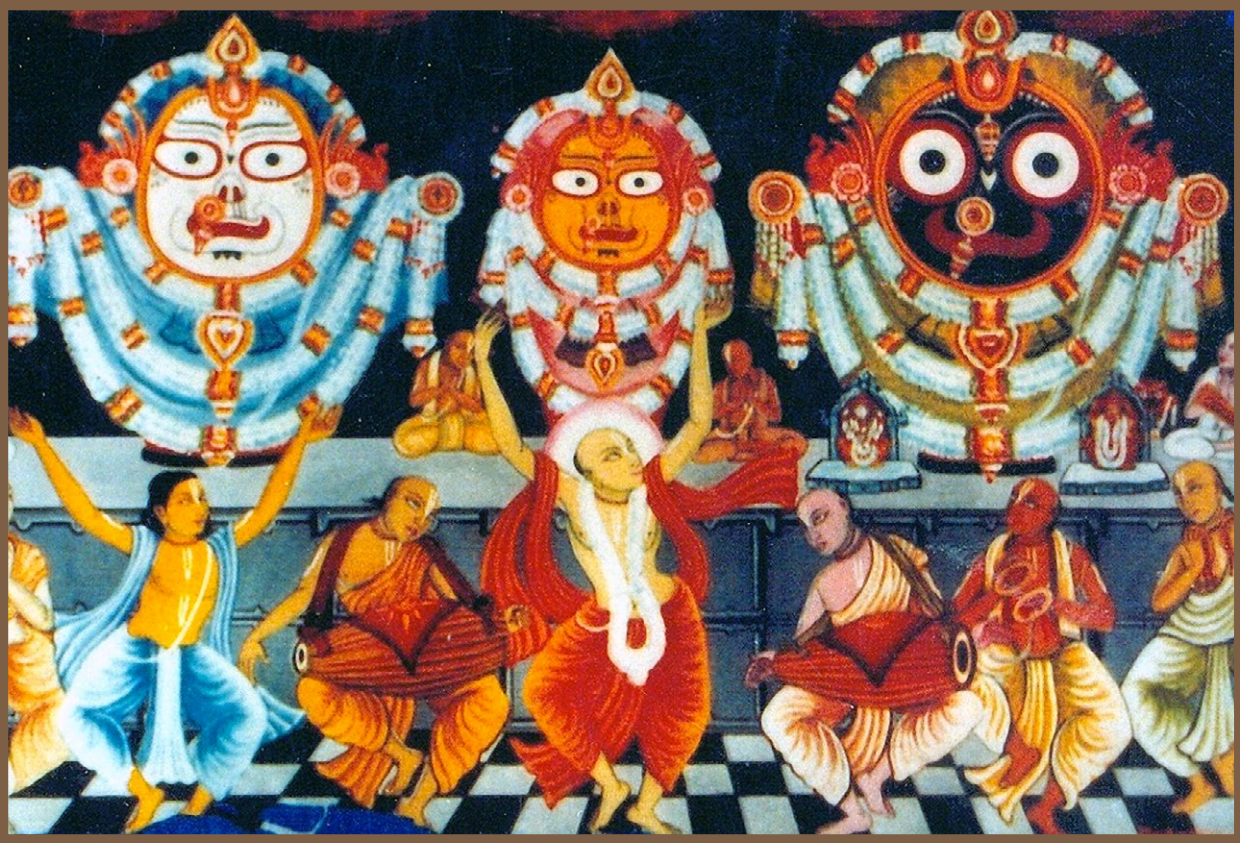

This is called *laulyam*, and such tears are the price for the highest perfection. If one develops this *laulyam*, or excessive eagerness for meeting and serving the Lord in a particular way, that is the price to enter into the kingdom of God. Otherwise, there is no material calculation for the value of the ticket by which one can enter the kingdom of God. The only price for such entrance is this *laulyam lālasā-mayī*, or desire and great eagerness. 🍌

CRYING OF THE SOUL

Sri Srimad Gour Govinda Swami Maharaja

Devotee: I recently read a purport wherein Srila Prabhupada says that doing *bhajana* in *vipralamba-bhāva* is the easiest way to develop love of God.

Gour Govinda Swami: Yes. Without *vipralamba-bhāva* how can you develop love of God? Feeling pangs of separation is the symptom of deep love, how you have developed love, real, pure love. That is the test, how you feel the separation, acute pangs of separation. If you have deep love, only you feel. Every moment you feel as if you are away, away, away. Yes. Every moment you feel so. This is the test of love, pure love, deep love, yes. Otherwise, if you can't feel so, you have no love. Yes. That is a fact. Therefore, Mahaprabhu came to teach this thing. Mahaprabhu is a teacher who is doing *ācārya-līlā* — teaching us. He is *prema-puruṣottama*,

The pure name of Krishna manifests when one cries while chanting the name of Krishna. Wealth and high birth are useless if one does not worship Krishna.

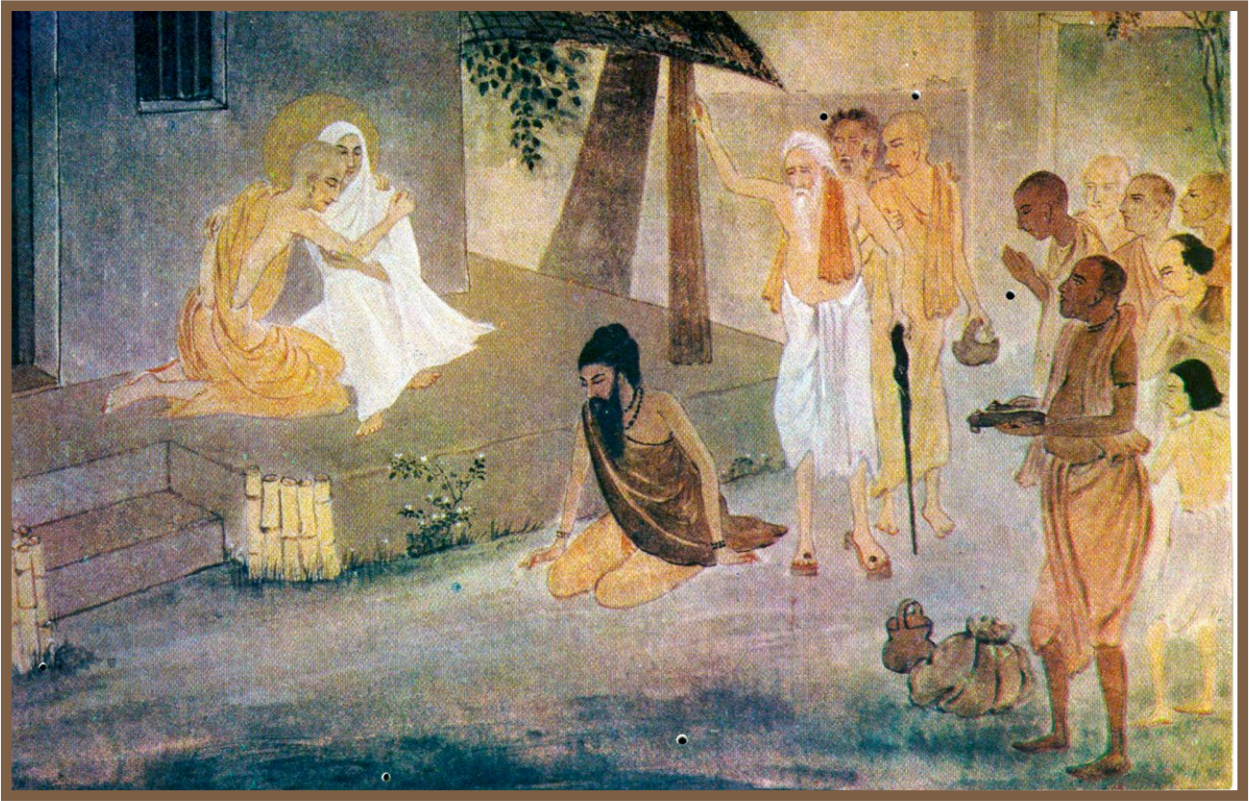

he gives indiscriminately *kṛṣṇa-prema* through chanting his holy name. And in what mood you will chant in your *bhajana*? With *vipralamba-bhāva*, feeling pangs of separation from Krishna. Crying in the heart, you will chant, *hare kṛṣṇa hare kṛṣṇa kṛṣṇa kṛṣṇa hare hare, hare rāma hare rāma rāma rāma hare hare*.

*tava kathāmṛtaṁ tapta-jīvanam
kavibhir iḍitaṁ kalmaṣāpaham
śravaṇa-maṅgalaṁ śrīmad ātataṁ
bhuvī grṇanti ye bhūri-dā janāḥ*

The nectar of your words and the descriptions of your activities are the life and soul of those suffering in this material world. These narrations, transmitted by learned sages, eradicate one's sinful reactions and bestow good fortune upon whoever hears them. These narrations are broadcast all over the world and are filled with spiritual power. Certainly those who spread the message of Godhead are most munificent. (*Bhāg.* 10.31.9)

Therefore, it says: O Lord! O Krishna! Your *kathā* is nectarean, *āmṛta*. Your holy name, your *kathā*, are very nectarean. They are like nectar, *āmṛta* — a soothing balm to the afflicted, distressed heart. *Tapta-jīvanam*, those conditioned souls who are distressed, on this miserable material platform — *duḥkhālayam*. This is the platform of all miseries — birth, death, old age, and disease. They are also afflicted with three *tapas*,

ādyātmika, *ādihidivika*, *ādibhautika* — sufferings from one's own body and mind, sufferings from nature such as ill weather, etc., and sufferings coming from others. The hearts of the *gopīs* headed by Radha are afflicted, feeling acute pangs of separation from Krishna. That separation is like a blazing fire wherein acute heat is produced and their heart is afflicted. Yet it is also soothing balm for them. When they feel such acute pangs of separation from Krishna — their heart is so much afflicted, with intense heat of separation — they chant *hare kṛṣṇa hare kṛṣṇa kṛṣṇa kṛṣṇa hare hare, hare rāma hare rāma rāma rāma hare hare*. This is *vipralamba-bhāva*. *golokera prema-dhana hari-nāma-saṅkīrtana* — In Goloka, this *hari-nāma-saṅkīrtana* is chanted. It is *prema-dhana* — it gives *prema*. Those who have developed such deep love for Krishna, they feel that its culmination is *viraha* — feeling pangs of separation. In Goloka, the *gopīs*, headed by Radharani feeling such acute pangs of separation chant *hare kṛṣṇa hare kṛṣṇa kṛṣṇa kṛṣṇa hare hare, hare rāma hare rāma rāma rāma hare hare*. Hare there means Hari, O Hari, O Krishna, O Rama. Crying, crying. This chanting is the crying of the soul — *ātmā-krandana*. Here in the material world, conditioned souls chant Hari, meaning "O Radharani!" One of the names of Radharani is "Hara". In address

form it is “Hare”. For conditioned souls, “Hare” means “O Hari, O Radharani”. But for the *gopīs* and Radha who are feeling the pangs of separation, it means “O Hari! O Rama! O Krishna!” If you develop this deep love for Krishna, the culmination of which is separation, *viraha*, *vipralamba*, then you will cry in the heart and chant as they are chanting. That is Mahaprabhu’s teaching, *vipralamba-bhāva* — feeling separation at every moment. So much acute pain is there in the heart. This *kathāmṛta* is the soothing balm for that pain. If your chanting is pure and offenseless you will get *prema*. A conditioned soul under the guidance of a bona fide guru, a *premi-bhakta* dear devotee of Gauranga Mahaprabhu who has developed such *prema*, always feeling the pangs of separation, chants in that mood. Under his guidance, a conditioned soul comes, accepts his lotus feet, becomes a disciple and chants under his guidance. If their chanting is pure and offenseless, then they will develop *prema* the culmination of which is *viraha*, *vipralamba* — feeling pangs of separation. 🍌

THE VALUE OF TEARS



Continuing from the last issue, the following is an excerpt from an article published in 1934-35 in the weekly Gauḍīya Prabandhāvalī magazine that was edited and published by Srila Bhaktisiddhanta Saraswati Thakur Prabhupada. Per the standard of the periodical, no name was given for the author of this article. It was edited and published under the guidance of Srila Bhaktisiddhanta Sa,raswati Thakur Prabhupada and later compiled in a book by Bhakti Bhushan Bharati Goswami.

Maitreya Rishi speaks:

*yasmin bhagavato netrān nyapatann aśru-bindavaḥ
kṛpayā samparītasya prapanne ‘rpitayā bhṛśam*

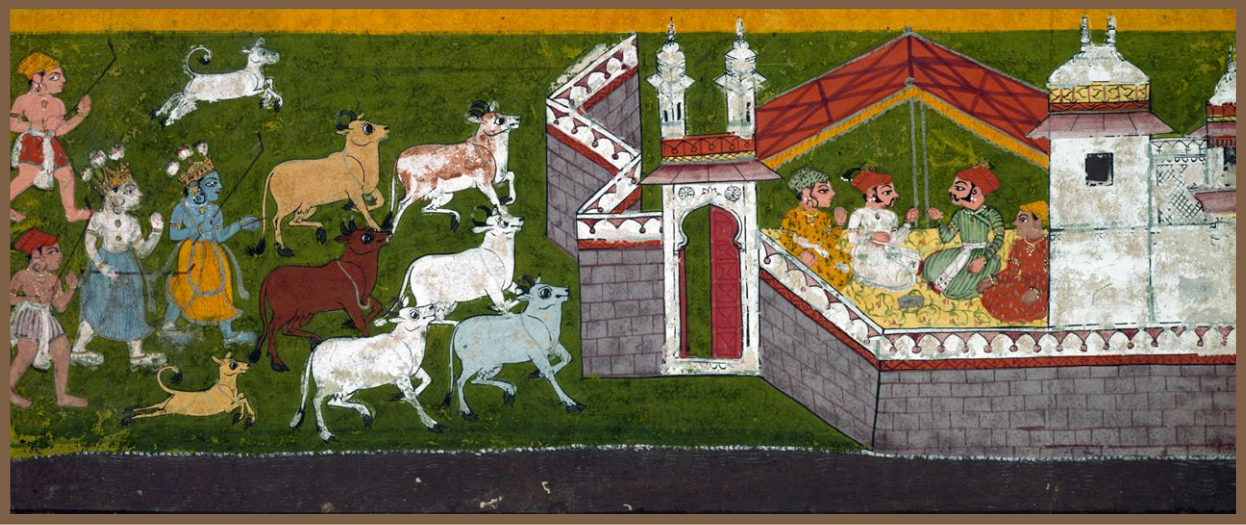
*tad vai bindusaro nāma sarasvatyā pariplutaṁ
puṇyaṁ śivāmṛta-jalaṁ maharṣi-gaṇa-sevitam*

“In this sacred *āśrama*, overwhelmed by boundless compassion and affection for the surrendered Kardama Rishi, tears of divine joy fell from the lotus eyes

of Bhagavan. Filled and sanctified by the waters of the Saraswati, that lake became renowned as Bindu-sarovara. Its waters are supremely pure, auspicious, nectar-like, sweet to taste, and perpetually served by the great sages.” (*Bhāg.* 3.21.38–39)

Such is the unfathomable worth of a surrendered devotee’s tears, that they can draw forth the tears of compassion from the very eyes of Sri Bhagavan himself. From those divine droplets is formed the eternal and auspicious lake known as Bindu-sarovara, ever overflowing with nectar-like waters in which the devotees bathe forever. By worshipping Sri Shukadev (Sri Vishnu) in the serene mood of *śānta-rati*, Kardama Rishi attained complete perfection and bestowed such supreme auspiciousness upon the world. In the same way, those *sādhakas* who worship *mahā-vādānya* Sri Gaurahari through the sacred stream of *aśru-gaṅgā*, the tears born of pure devotion, possess a worth immeasurable even for those absorbed solely in *brahmānanda*. What to speak of them, even the residents of Vaikuntha are unable to bestow the value of such tears.

Those who, like Ramachandra Puri, take pride in their *brahma-jñāna* fail to recognize the priceless value of the tears flowing from the lotus eyes of Sri Madhavendra Puripad, and thus commit offense at the feet of Sri Guru and Gauranga.

Sri Gaurahari has condemned the Upanishadic conception of *brahma-jñāna* devoid of the softening of the heart, devoid of trembling, tears, and horripilation:

*śrutam apy aupaniṣadam dūre hari-kathāmṛtam
yan na santi dravac-citta-kampāśru-pulakādayam*

Upanishads which, though heard, do not produce a melted heart, trembling of the body, tears and hairs standing on end, are far inferior to the nectar of the Lord’s pastimes. (Sri Jiva Goswami’s *Bhakti-sandarbhā, anuccheda* 69, quoting Srila Rupa Goswami’s *Padyāvalī* 39.)

For only through the nectar of *hari-kathā* does the pure heart of the *jīva* become softened, trembling arise, tears flow, and the eight *sāttvika* transformations manifest. If such symptoms are absent in mere

Worship of young Krishna

Upaniṣadic brahma-jñāna, then let that conception of *Brahma-jñāna* remain far from us, for in truth it is of no necessity whatsoever.

Sri Sri Gaurahari, the embodiment of *mahābhāva*, reveals through his *līlā* of seeking Sri Krishna's happiness both the external and internal manifestations of *siddhi*, the perfection of *sādhyabhakti*. Significantly, in his descriptions of each (*Śikṣāṣṭakam* 6-7), he extols tears as possessing the highest spiritual value.

*nayanam galad-aśru-dhārayā vadanam gadgada-ruddhayā girā
pulakair nicitam vapuḥ kadā tava nāma-grahaṇe bhaviṣyati?
yugāyitam nimeṣeṇa cakṣuṣā prāvṛṣāyitam
śūnyāyitam jagat sarvaṁ govinda-virahaṇa me*

In the first verse above, spoken from Sri Gaurahari's divine lips, the external symptom of perfection is revealed; and in the second, the internal symptom. In both places, through the phrases "*nayanam galad-aśru-dhārayā*" and "*cakṣuṣā prāvṛṣāyitam*", it is declared that even in the supreme attainment of *sādhyabhakti*, tears remain the sole and ultimate treasure of the *jīva*. It has already been stated earlier that for the

most unqualified, burdened with countless *anarthas*, who are steeped in sense-desire, sinful, and offensive — the only path to auspiciousness is to worship the supremely compassionate Lord with tears born from an acute awareness of one's utter unworthiness, and with a heart offering intense, piercing prayers for grace. This truth was condensed by Srila Thakur Bhaktivinode into a single, jewel-like verse (*Śaraṇāgati* 11.4):

*yogyatā-vicāre, kichu nāhi pāi,
tomāra karuṇā-sāra
karuṇā nā hoile, kāndiyā kāndiyā,
prāṇa nā rākhibo āra*

When I examine myself, I find nothing of value. Therefore, your mercy is essential to me. If you are not merciful, I shall simply weep and weep, and I shall not maintain my life.

The followers of *varṇāśrama*, feeling themselves qualified, worship Vishnu through their perceived eligibility. The *jñānis*, having obtained the qualifications of renunciation, strive for the worship of Brahman. The *yogīs*, assured of their fitness in *aṣṭāṅga-sādhana*, attempt the worship of *Paramātmā*. Even the worshippers of

Sri Narayan, resting upon the sense of righteous conduct, labor for his attainment. But for the worshippers of the supreme compassionate reality, Sri Gaura–Nityananda, there is only one qualification: the profound and guileless experience of one’s complete disqualification. From this deep and unwavering awareness arises the unceasing flow of tears, and only by this, the utterly unfit *jīva* obtains the lotus feet of the most merciful Lord as a boat, effortlessly crossing the ocean of material existence, and even attaining the exceedingly rare fortune of immersing in the ocean of *bhakti-rasa*.

When the internal mood expressed as, *karuṇā nā hoile, kāṇḍiyā kāṇḍiyā, prāṇa nā rākhibo āra* — “If you are not merciful to me, then I will constantly weep and weep, no longer being able to maintain my life.” When this repenting mood becomes actual, dense, and exclusive, then the supreme compassionate reality becomes the suppliant, and enters and remains arrested within the heart of such a weeping soul. The tears that spring from an intense perception of unworthiness conquer the unconquerable Lord and bind his sovereign independence. They transform the perfectly impartial Almighty into *dīnavatsala* — a Lord uniquely partial and affectionate toward the fallen. (Article concludes here) 🍊
